Amethyst's flagship program provides permanent housing integrated with alcohol and other drug treatment, mental health treatment for survivors of physical, emotional or sexual trauma, integrated tobacco treatment, family programming – including nationally acclaimed Summer Quest day camp, an evidenced-based supported employment program, and intensive case management. Amethyst also operates RSVP, the Rapid Stabilization Program, a transitional housing and treatment program for women and families living in shelters. Residents graduate from RSVP into Amethyst's permanent housing and long-term treatment program. Women without housing needs can receive treatment and recovery support through STAR, a six-month outpatient program focusing on addictions and trauma recovery.

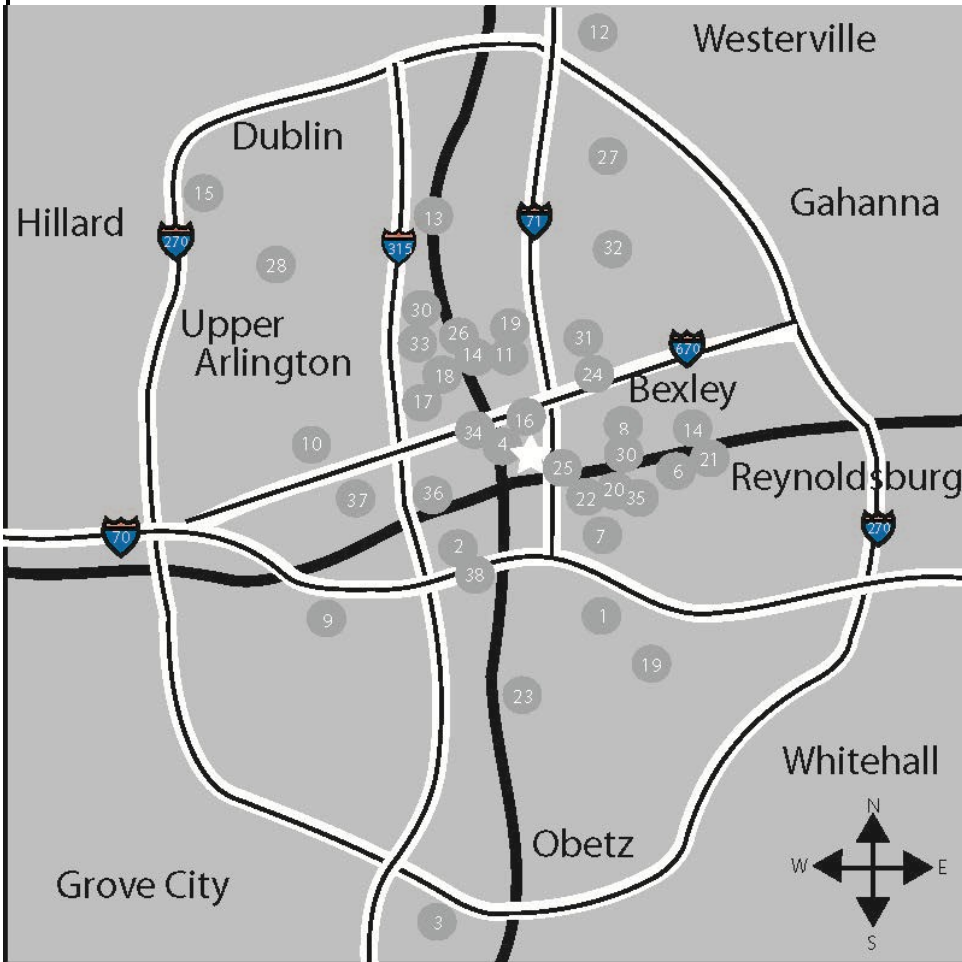

Project Linden provides services within Franklin County that are community based and are located within networking agencies, institutions, schools, recreation centers, prisons, homeless shelters, nursing homes centers, churches, half-way houses, runaway shelters, prenatal clinics/health centers and treatment agencies.

Rosemont Center is a treatment facility for young persons and their families experiencing difficulty.

Services include:

- **Community Support Program:** provides 24-hour, 7-day-a-week case manager availability to assist emotionally disordered adolescents in achieving and maintaining self-sufficiency through strengthening of personal and family abilities and resources.
- **Crisis Care & Assessment Center:** provides a safe, temporary residence for adolescent girls and boys between the ages of 6-11 and 12-18 year-old women who are in a crisis.
- **Day Treatment/Partial Hospitalization:** a chartered school that includes mental health, and alcohol/other drug treatment for boys and girls, 12-18.
- **Outpatient Services:** provides mental health services to youth and families from birth to age 19, using a competency based focus that builds on strengths and health, utilizing solution-focused therapy which involves both the child and their family.
- **R.O.A.D.S.:** "Rethinking Our Attitudes and Decisions about Safety," provides residential treatment for sexually reactive 6-12 year-old boys.
- **Therapeutic Foster Care:** provides treatment services in a community-based setting for children and adolescents.
- **Pathways:** Center for Assessment & Planning: provides short-term placements (7-10 days) for the purpose of Diagnostic Assessments to determine the appropriate level of care for youth and establish treatment goals and recommendations. This program is for females, ages 6-18 and males, ages 6-12; outpatient assessments available for all youth.
- **Sexual Abuse Treatment Program:** provides individual/family counseling for children who have experienced sexual abuse. The program also provides services to those rare few who have developed sexual behavior problems. This program serves children of all ages who have been sexually abused, have sexual behavior problems, girls of all ages, boys younger than 12.
